

Bills Intended to Save Administrative Claiming

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) is continuing its attempts to eliminate school-based Medicaid administrative claiming and special transportation reimbursement. The potential effect of the elimination of these programs would result in an annual loss of revenue to Pennsylvania LEAs of over \$20 million.

Senator Edward Kennedy (D-MA) introduced S578 in the Senate and

Representative John Dingell (D-MI) introduced H.R. 1017 in the House. These identical bills, as suggested by their name, "Protecting Children's Health in Schools Act of 2007," contain language that would protect the continuation of these programs. Leader will continue to advocate this bill on behalf of our LEAs.

Parent Consent Requirement Poses New Challenge

The 2004 reauthorization of IDEA included the requirement for LEAs to obtain informed, written parental consent to access public and private insurance including Medicaid. As a result of this requirement, which went into effect Oct. 13, 2006, reimbursement for the 2006-2007 school year is predicted to decrease, making it the first time in the program's 15-year history that reimbursement will have declined from the previous year.

PDE Report Changes

All financials in the PDE Report now reflect the amount of federal reimbursement that was recovered by Pennsylvania LEAs, rather than the total amount that was billed in claims. Participating LEAs include school districts, MAWAs, intermediate units, charter schools, and approved private schools.

This year's report also differentiates between the reimbursement that was recovered by the Early Intervention Program and the School-Age Program.


SBAP is a cooperative initiative among PDE, the state Department of Public Welfare (DPW), the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), and PDE's contractor, Leader Services.





The graph below represents the growth of SBAP-recovered funds for the last six years. Ongoing growth of the program is due in part to the continued support of PDE, DPW, and the efforts of participating LEAs.

Historically, the number of services billed and dollars recovered have steadily increased. Most of the health-related services provided to special education students are included in the program. PDE, DPW, and Leader Services work collaboratively to enhance existing services, benefiting LEAs and taxpayers across the state. As PDE's program contractor, Leader educates SBAP providers concerning program operations, documentation requirements, and ongoing supportive administrative responsibilities.



Note: From the program's inception in 1992 through June 2000, more than \$141 million was recovered through SBAP on behalf of LEAs across the Commonwealth (*the chart above reflects funds recovered for 2000-01 through 2005-06 only*).








SBAP Services Distribution

Since the inception of SBAP in 1992, LEAs have recovered more than **\$576 million** in federal Medicaid reimbursement.
